# Extract from Eugene McDermott's writings, printed December 20, 1971.

There is at least one place that will tell you it was Christmas Eve, if you were returning from a journey along the planets. For on this night, and this night alone - Arranmore becomes an island of light but can be seen from afar. On Christmas Eve it has always seemed an enchanted land where the Heavens have come down, and where, on the backcloth of the ocean, the stars are gleaming just as they do in the skies above.

Now, I have made home on that island, which I always longed to gaze on at Christmastime.

For years past, on Christmas Eve, I used to drive from Meenacross to Maghery, Dungloe and Burtonport, just especially to see that panorama of light that shone on the ocean's edge.

The sight entranced me. Vividly, it portrayed the excitement that is Christmas, so visibly affecting those who dwell across the sea. Deeply, it made me feel that Christmas, for all its annual reoccurrence, is an epochal event that transforms this world of ours. From every window, in every house in Arranmore, the candleliaht was aleamina. Because the houses are all on the landward side, you could see each glistening light. The beacons and the perches added their rays of red and white, and the areat beam from the powerful lighthouse searched the sky. A thousand golden threads of light were reflected in the waters of the bay. Fairy bridges that rose and fell with the waves, seemed to join the Island to the mainland. It was a scene from a magic winter wonderland.

Now I see the lights from within. I have not the panoramic view I used to have. But I perceive details of beauty and of colour that I missed before. And I appreciate more the message of intimate friendship that the lights convey.

On the windows, the blinds are not drawn. Two candles (and not one as I thought) are burning on each window-sill. We can see into each neighbours kitchen and he into ours. Each house is open to the other, and people are running back and forth all night. Tonight,

it is supremely true we are one big happy family.

Islanders love light – they are used to the light from the sea and the light from the sky. In the long winters nights, they have missed it badly. there being - incomprehensibly - no public liahting on our island. But this night, they are making up for the deprivation in one great alorious spree of candle-burning abandon. I can view the huge arc of intermittent light that stretches from Glen Head to Bloody Foreland, with here and there, a cluster of special brightness and with a cloud of colour hovering over Dungloe Town. I note that the mainland lights always seem closer to the island than the island lights seem to the mainland - isolation always creating the illusion of distance.

The candles shining from the window-sills are a feature of the Gaeltacht everywhere, and add their charm to all those homes in Cloughaneely and Gweedore that nestle in the foothills of Errigal and the mountains of the West. But, viewed across moving waters, they have an effervescence that makes them more entrancing still, and it is from the islands, that the message of the lights is most impressive and heart-warming. On Arranmore, as in all the Gaeltacht, the belief that the Christ Child walks again on Earth on Christmas Eve has long been held- and the candles in the windows are meant to guide Him on His way.

It is a lovely belief that has got striking corroboration in recent years. For now, we realise as we did not do before, that Christ is specially present whenever men's hearts are moved to kindness and to love – as happens pre-eminently on that night that ushers in the season of goodwill.

On the islands, more than elsewhere, Christmas is a festival of homecoming. The islander is compelled to travel, of it is only to the mainland, and the tradition of sea-faring and adventure has given us more than our share of exiles. There will be many a party in many a neighbour's house, and many a story of life at home and of life abroad will be swopped. And the big community gatherings will still further assure the homecomers that they still belong.
