Reopening our Churches.

When you come to Mass you will be met at the door by an usher. They will ask you to sanitise vour hands upon entry, and find you a seat. At this point you can place your envelope/contribution to the church in a basket at the door, as there will be no collection during Mass. You can indicate to them if you are a cluster who can sit together. When you reach the pew, you can sit at either end. If there is no exit at the other end of the pew, we ask you to move on in to the inside seat. The seat may then be occupied by another person at the other end. Mass will continue in the usual way. After the priest receives communion. He will continue to the prayer after communion and give the final blessing. Then will communion be distributed. The usher will indicate which row is to come to the priest for Communion taking care to maintain the 2 meter distance from the person in front. Once you receive, you can leave the chapel, making sure not to double back on those who are following you to the altar. We ask you to maintain the physical distance at all times.

So for example in Acres there are three aisles. Those on the Those on the extreme right will leave their pew and come towards the altar and then leave down the centre aisle. Then the other side of that pew will approach the altar, Leaving by the said aisle that is already empty.

In Kincasslagh, those who are at the Keadue door will receive and leave through one of the other two doors, not doubling back on the communicants behind them. Each Aisle will be emptied in this way until all have left the buildina.

This is trail and error folks. All we ask is form your co-operation with the ushers until we work out a system that works for us. Thank you.
