Fergus Finlay writes in the Irish Examiner about Fr. John Joe...

My Outstanding Irish Person of the Year Award goes to a Catholic priest. When he woke up on the morning of October 7 last, Fr John Joe Duffy could have had no idea of what lay ahead of him and his community, and no way of preparing for the appalling tragedy that was about to unfold. But in the middle of that afternoon, a terrible explosion rocked the little village of

Creeslough. First responders rushed to the scene, and all night long the search continued for bodies. By the following morning, it had been established that 10 people had died in the accident. They included a little girl and two teenagers, and all of them had full and long lives ahead of them.



For the next week or more, Fr Duffy shouldered the grief of a community and managed somehow to reflect the feelings of the whole country.

Shock and horror were replaced by pain and an awful sense of bereavement. He seemed, with amazing grace and considerable strength, to be able to offer comfort and to make sense of the inexplicable.

An ordinary priest in a quiet little place, the last thing he would have wanted, I'm sure, is to be recognised by anyone as the most outstanding Irish person of the year. But we — all of us owe him that.
